If the problem was outside, Hershel Boles, Ben Erwin, and

others would take care of it. If it was inside, Dewitt Rains, with his cheerful attitude, would be at your door almost before you hung up the phone. This is unheard of today.

The telephone company name took some explaining. Telephones take me way back to the time I first set foot in Crockett over 60 years ago. The founder of the Crockett Telephone Co. was John Cook, Louis Cook's grandfather, who was still living but the company was run by Loch Cook, Louis Cook's father.

The ones who really kept it going was chief operator, Mrs. Beaty, and operators Edith Pitts, later Conway, the Halmark sisters, and others working on the inside and Garland Ellis and later Clem Copus on the outside.

Later the company was sold to J.B. McDuff with the promise of a countywide dial telephone system that was supposed to speed up the service. We really didn't appreciate how fast our old service was. Back then you could pick up the phone, don't worry about a number, just tell one of the girls who you

wanted and if the person was at home they would connect you, if not they would tell you where the person had gone.

It really came in handy if you wanted a doctor. They would run him down for you. It was really better than CNN news in finding out what was going on in Crockett because it had a personal touch that is unknown to day.
