Juanita was a charismatic, born leader, who never met a stranger. She was also a rebel at heart, loving to challenge rules. When she was already the mother of four children and the wife of a traveling husband, she taught herself to drive on the freeways of Houston. Juanita loved to speed when she was behind the wheel!

Juanita attended the Baptist church from childhood but accepted Christ as her personal savior years later as an adult. A member of the Central Baptist Church in Crockett, she gave generously of her time. talents, and money. She visited local nursing homes to give comfort. She had a natural affinity for children and youth, and encouraged them to develop their talents and to realize their potential. She took them into her heart and loved them deeply, spending one-on-one time with them and financially supporting their Juanita had many dear friends, especially the members of her Sunday School class.
